CYAB DECISION-MAKING PRINCIPLES

Decision: The King County Children and Youth Advisory Board created the following list of principles and values to be mindful and hold while making decisions at board meetings. The CYAB agreed to these principles as launch points to discussions when creating charters, advisory statements, and governance structures. April 25, 2016

- 1. Willingness to compromise
- 2. Respectful discourse is part of the process
- 3. Willingness to make hard decisions and move on
- 4. Try to move out of our own lane
- 5. Maintain a spirit of inquiry
- 6. Honor different learning styles
- 7. Focus on children and communities, but do not use a moral high ground, rather encourage that the status quo is interrupted. Recognize the voice of others, but be reminded that one person does not, or cannot represent an entire group.
- 8. Model the change we want; be reflective.
- 9. Uphold a commitment to racial equity. Recognize and support one another and call out language used that is not supportive of equity or that is offensive.
- 10. The CYAB are shared stewards of public money
- 11. Operate in the spirit of deep empathy.
- 12. When things are uncomfortable, it is an opportunity to learn and grow.
- 13. Use strength-based language.
- 14. Be present.
- 15. Acknowledge your privilege and challenge it.
- 16. Assume best intentions.
- 17. Individual differences exist in the room.
- 18. Transformational change requires us to see the system and think BIG!
- 19. Maintain a commitment to continuous learning and quality improvement.

When this list was originally created, a second list was placed on the wall to honor learning styles. This was done so that others who may need to process, could add their ideas.

- 20. Be a good listener.
- 21. Make decisions and recommendations that challenge the status quo (systems, policies, processes, etc.) and err on the side of equity.
- 22. Help build a campaign.
- 23. Children are front and center, versus systems.
