

In our One on One interviews, a few members voiced concern over the security and safety of our community if we display overt signs of welcome to the LGBTQIA2+ community.

- Gospel call / Beloved Community
 - Dr. Martin Luther King's Beloved Community was not devoid of interpersonal, group or international conflict. Instead he recognized that conflict was an inevitable part of human experience. But he believed that conflicts could be resolved peacefully and adversaries could be reconciled through a mutual, determined commitment to nonviolence. No conflict, he believed, need erupt in violence. And all conflicts in The Beloved Community should end with reconciliation of adversaries cooperating together in a spirit of friendship and goodwill.

Study Questions:

- What can we do at CTK to help people feel truly welcome regardless of age, gender, sexuality, race, level of ability, neuro-diversity, etc.?
- What are some things we could provide in/outside our facilities to help people know this is a welcoming space?
- What are some things we can do to ensure the safety of our CTK family—both present and future?
- What else do you, personally, want to learn about LGBTQIA2+ people?
